The International Conference on Passports, Customs Formalities and Trade Duties held under the auspices of the Provisional Committee on Communications and Trade of the League of Nations, and charged with the study of methods necessary to facilitate international passenger traffic by rail, air and sea especially by air, port and customs facilities, as well as the difficulties of obtaining the necessary documents, considered that the existing difficulties affecting passenger traffic between the peoples of various countries constitute a serious obstacle to the resumption of normal intercourse between the different countries of the world;

Being of the opinion, further, that the legitimate duty of every Government for the safeguarding of its security and rights prohibits, for the time being, the total abolition of restrictions and that complete return to pre-war conditions which the Conference hopes, nevertheless, to gradually re-establish in the near future;

Decides that the League of Nations shall invite the Conference to adopt the following [REDACTED] with as little delay as possible.

a. Issuance of [REDACTED]

a. Establishment of a uniform type of "Passport" [REDACTED] (international type), by which will be identified for all countries, in the most facilitating manner, during the journey (model as per Annex I), to be issued at the latest by July 1st, 1921, and to supersede all other types.

b. Duration of validity of passport. — The passport will normally be issued for a single journey or for a period of two years. The validity of the passport is [REDACTED] for purposes may be extended.

c. Fee to be collected. — The fee charged shall not be of a fiscal character and will be collected without any discrimination between countries for which the passport is issued, and with absolute equality as between "nationals" and "non-nationals" in the event of the passport being issued by a Government to persons other than its "nationals".

d. Diplomatic passports. — Diplomatic passports or visas will only be granted to persons falling within the categories mentioned in Annex II, the form of diplomatic passport being left entirely to the discretion of the issuing State.

6. Limitation of preliminary view — "Recitation." — (This is limited by the time during the period of the representation) will only be required in the vicinity of the place of exhibition. The views shall be free of charge.

2. Duration of a visa. — For purposes intended for a single journey, the validity of the visa will be the same as that of the passport. For purposes intended for stays which will be valid for one year, except in absolutely exceptional cases, Government might then be entitled to give a visa of two months' validity in the hope of saving the giving out of visas altogether. The Government might modify the law so as to allow the issuing of visas for six months for the information of other countries to the following, both ordinary temporary and exceptional visas of a long duration, given by its officials. It is important, however, that the right of validity of a visa does not imply the right to stay or to settle for a corresponding period in the territory of the State granting the visa. Except for special cases justified by considerations of national security, a visa will always be valid in all foreign countries.

8. FEE CHARGE.—The maximum fee [REDACTED] will be made irrespective of the nationality of the holder of the passport [REDACTED] by the Ministry of the State issuing the visa. Nevertheless, the nationals of states granting to nationals of other countries [REDACTED] may themselves be accorded reciprocity. Any Government desiring a future date to withdraw is asked to inform the Secretary-General at least three months in advance of the date when such a decision is to take effect.

The Conference agrees, further, that the League of Nations should be the organ of the Conference for settling disputes, the carrying out of which will be left to the High Tribunal. But this does not prevent the League from intervening.

(c) Proposed Agreement. — That adjacent States shall endeavor, after entry into agreement with each other, to prevent from passing through their classes of persons who are not bona fide residents, and can be taken as a guarantee of their identity (e.g. C. 1907, § 22, 2d. and 3d. sections, in respect of non-identity persons etc.)

(1) Entomological surveys and mapping of distribution. — That subject to the joint-venture agreement of the right of aquilum, the Government shall, as far as practicable, make arrangements with a view to preventing the crossing by any State of entomological lines into its territory in areas where the movement itself has not been imposed for that purpose.

(e) **Facilities for miners** — That States should accord to the holders of permits to mine mineral rights such facilities for equipment as are compatible with their health, safety, the welfare of the community, the protection of the environment, the economic situation and with the interests of agriculture; and that, with this end in view, States should simplify, as far as possible, the regulations governing the filing of the plans of operations, subject to those mentioned in paragraph

(c) Signification of frontiers.—That States should enter as far as possible into mutual
agreements with one another, first, in establishing joint control of points of entry
and of frontier posts, and then, by the joint utilization of such posts, especially
by providing that the authorities giving a visa for the entry of the nation
shall also undertake the necessary formalities for leaving it again, and so forth,
it will facilitate the making of passport formalities as far as possible. If countries

- (a) International stations. — That all stations as far as possible should be international.
That Customs offices and their administration by the Customs should be international.
- (b) International railway stations. — That the arrangement of international railway stations for passenger traffic before departure of important trains.
- (c) International airports. — That the arrangement of international airports should take place as far as possible at international centres.
- (d) Examination of luggage in general. — That any further examination of hand luggage should be as possible to the place (unless this is possible with numerous staff available) on board trains in the case of international trains, in the earliest possible moment at frontier stations.
- (e) Limits of luggage. — That, where possible in international trains, the Customs should see that regulations concerning the limitation of weight and the description of articles which may be carried as luggage are strictly observed.

- (f) International through trains and express trains. — That international through trains and express trains should as far as possible, be published in the earliest possible moment that the arrangements of Customs should be done to the international trains according to the arrangements to the end, as soon as possible.

- (g) That the most careful measures should be taken to ensure the safety of travel and in the earliest possible moment to public health.
That adequate measures should be taken, as far as possible, for the transportation of migrants.
That prolonged stays abroad or other stays for the purpose of work, of tourists, or sojourner facilities in connection with the transportation of migrants should take place in material facilities which permit of this being done without harm to the public health.
That authorities issuing permits to migrants should, at the same time, furnish them with particulars of the society and other conditions in which they will be subject, and the expenses which they will incur on route and arrival in the country of destination.

The Conference proposes that the League of Nations should invite the Committee to inform the League in due course of the action taken with respect to any or all of these recommendations.

[REDACTED] INTERNATIONAL " PASSPORT.

(The model is that of a passport such as would be issued by the Spanish Government.)

The passport is to contain 20 pages. The first four pages only are numbered 1 with. The other 16 pages should all be numbered and should contain the views of the countries for which the passport is valid.

The passport should be drawn up in at least two languages, i.e., in the national language and in French.

The passport must be bound in cardboard, bearing on the top the name and in the centre the coat of arms of the country and at the bottom the word "Passport", with the addition according to the desire of the various Governments, of any practical information concerning the regime of passports.

Any passport of which the pages are entirely filled must be replaced by a fresh passport.


